ST. FABIAN Pope and Martyr

Not much is known about St. Fabians life before he

was elected Pope in the year 236. According to historian Eusebius St. Fbian was elected like this. St. Fabian, a layman and stranger in Rome, at a time when a new Pope, after the death of Pope Anterus, needed to be elected. As St Fabian was standing in a crowd, a dove descended and rested on his head. To people around him it was a reminder of the descend of the Holy Spirit on Jesus at His baptism. Believing it to be a divine intervention and Fabian was chosen to be Pope. In the year 250 he suffered martyrdom, after having served 14 years as Pope

ST. SEBASTIAN

Martyr, Patron of Athletes and Soldiers.

Facts about St. Sebastian are that he was born at Narbonne in Gaul and was educated in Milano. He was martyred in 284 in Rome and is verated since the 4^{th} century.



Legend tells us that St. Sebastian rendered assistance to persecuted Christians during the reign of Emperor Carinus. St. Sebastian was then accused before Diocletia who condemned hi to be shot to death with arrows. He was executed and erroneously left for dead. A pious widow caring for him restored him back to health. Sebastian then appeared to a surprised Emperor to reproach him for the injustices against Christians. Again St. Sebastian was condemned to be beaten to death with clubs. His dead body was thrown into a sewer. A pious lady had the Saint's body secretly removed and buried in the catacombs.

Lord, grant us a spirit of strength. Taught by the glorious example of Your Martyrs may we learn how to obey You rather then men.

January 21st

ST. AGNES

St. Agnes was probably born in the early years of the 4th century and martyred at the age of 12 during the Roman persecution. She is a symbol of virginal innocence and is the most highly regarded of the Roman



martyrs. The young noblemen of Rome, attracted by her wealth and beauty, vied with one another to obtain her hand in marriage, but she refused them all, saying that she had chosen a Spouse who could not be seen by mortal eyes. In the hope of shaking her constancy, her suitors accused her of being a Christian. She was brought before a judge. She remained unswayed by either his kindness or his threads. She was tortured and sent to a house of prostitution, but the sight of her inspired such awe, that not one of the wicked youths dared approach her. St. Agnes came forth from this den uncontaminated in mind and body – still the pure spouse of Christ. The most prominent of her suitors brought more charges against her and so the heroic Virgin was condemned to be beheaded. St. Ambrose said that Agnes went to the place of execution more cheerful than others go to their wedding. St. Agnes went to meet her Immortal Spouse, whom she loved better than her life, while onlookers wept.

All-powerful and ever-living God, You choose the weak in this world to put the powerful to shame. As we celebrate the anniversary of the martyrdom of St. Agnes, may we like her remain constant in faith. Amen.



January 22nd

ST. VINCENT

St. Vincent, a native of Spain, was instructed by Valerius, Bishop of Saragosso, Spain, who ordained him his Deacon and appointed him, though quite young, to preach and

instruct the people in the Christian Faith. As Deacon he was also responsible for the Church's works of charity and mercy. St. Vincent excelled in all his duties. In the year 303, the Emperors Diocletian and Maximian published their bloody edicts against Christian Clergy. The following year they extended these edicts to laity. Dacian, Governor of Spain and the bloodiest persecutor apprehended St. Vincent and his Bishop and had them dragged in chains to Valencia. There they were kept in prison being starved and suffering other tortures. Dacian contented himself by banishing Valerius, but kept and tormented Vincent unmercifully. He had St. Vincent stretched on the rack by his hands and feet. And drawn until his joints were almost torn apart. In that posture his flesh was torn off with iron hooks and salt put in his wounds. Through all this savages St. Vincent seemed to find joy in suffering for Christ. He died in 304 and became Spain's the first Martvr. ****
