Born in 1838, St. Gabriel, a Saint of modern

times was given the name Francis at Baptism, after the great Saint of his native Assisi. Attending the Jesuit college of Spoleto, were he was well liked by his fellow students and professors. After being miraculously cured from two bouts of illness he was guides by Our Lady into the Passionist Institute, where he took the name Gabriel and became a true Apostle of our Lady's Sorrows. At the age of twenty-four he died of tuberculosis, having already attained a degree of sanctity by a life of self-denial and great devotion to Our Lord's Passion. After his death many miracles occurred at his tomb in Isola di Gran Sasso, Italy. Pope Benedict the XV canonized St. Gabriel in 1920.

God, You inspired St. Gabriel to strive for perfect charity and so attain Your Kingdom at the end of his pilgrimage on earth. Strengthen us through his intercession that we may advance rejoicing in the way of love. Amen

The Stations of the Cross

Why does the Church encourage us, especially during Lent, to walk the Stations of the Cross? What is the purpose reminding us of the sufferings of Our Lord? What are these Stations teaching us?



1.) Jesus is condemned to death. Jesus was innocent of all accusations, but he took the sentence without complaint. Would we? How often do we, like Pilate, go with public opinion and not by our conscience? Do we wash our hands of wrong doings, because it is easier? 2.) Jesus carries His Cross. Jesus took the sacrifice of taking the cross, are we willing to make the sacrifice to avoid sin? Are we willing to carry burdens, without complaining? 3.) Jesus falls for the first time. Jesus is telling us, that when we fall and fail and we will, we can get up and carry on. 4.) Jesus meets His Mother. Jesus and His Mother had faith in each other. Mary might not have understood why her son would go to His death without revolting, but she accepted Jesus' acceptance and suffered quietly with Him. 5.) Simon of Cyrene helps Jesus carry His Cross. Sometimes we have to be pushed into doing the right thing like Simon, but when Simon recognized that it was the right thing to do, he helped joyfully, and so should we no matter how hard it is to do. 6.) Veronica wipes Jesus' face. What courage Veronica displayed! Do we have the courage to step out and help somebody who is not popular? We should think of Veronica and try. 7.) Jesus falls for the second time. Jesus is weak, but he gets up again and continues with confidence. Do we get up after failing more than once or do we give up on ourselves or on others? 8.) Jesus speaks to the women of Jerusalem. Some women saw Jesus' suffering and were moved by it and cried. Do we always show compassion to those who suffer around us? Do we cry at the moment and then forget about the other's sufferings and not do anything about it? 9.) Jesus falls for the third time. Jesus is exhausted and falls again. Jesus understands that we will continue to sin, because He knows that our flesh is weaker than our spirit, but He also wants us try over and over again to avoid sin. 10.) Jesus is stripped of His garments. How embarrassing for a chaste man like Jesus. He was stripped of His dignity. How often do we willingly strip ourselves of our dignity? 11.) Jesus is nailed to the Cross. Jesus accepted His fate. The hands that healed the sick, fed the hungry, gave us the Holy Eucharist are nailed to the cross. Do we accept this great gift of Jesus' love and so untie ourselves from sin? 12.) Jesus dies on the Cross. Jesus dies on the cross, but before he died he asked His Father to forgive us. Do we give our forgiveness as freely as Jesus did? Do we understand how much Jesus loved us and love Him in return? 13.) Jesus is taken down from the Cross. Would we have the courage to ask for Jesus' body? Do we have the courage to stand up for Jesus by doing the right thing? 14.) Jesus is laid in the tomb. We know that Jesus did not stay in the tomb, but rose from the dead; do we truly believe that He will also call us to rise with Him?

The Church encourages us to remember Jesus' sufferings, portrayed by the Stations of the Cross to see what our sinfulness does. How we hurt Jesus every time we sin. The Stations should encourages us to try harder not to sin, but they also tell us if we fall back into sin, not to despair, but to get up and try again. Let us pray for Faith that only our risen Lord can bless us with - The Faith and endurance that only Jesus can provide us with.
