#### ST. FRANCES XAVIER CABRINI

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Francesca Cabrini was born in Lodi, in northern Italy in the year 1850. She took her naming after St. Francis Xavier seriously. It was her desire to become a religious and in particular a missionary



even so she was physically small and frail in health. She applied to join 2 religious Orders, but was rejected by both. She became a schoolteacher and at the age of 22 was put in charge of a school. In 1880 the Bishop of Lodi, who was aware of her desire to become a missionary, summoned her. He told her, that if she wishes to become a missionary, she would have to found an Order for women missionaries, since he did not know of such an institute. She found a house for this purpose and the Missionary Sisters of the Sacred Heart were founded. After the Papal approval of the new Order, the institute spread rapidly and new houses founded. Pope Leo the XIII urged Mother Cabrini not to look to the East, but to the West to aid Italian emigrants in America. Obediently she surrendered her own plans to go to China and set sail for America. There she arrived March 31,1889. An orphanage for Italian children, which she and her Sisters were to conduct, was not ready. She was advised by the Archbishop of New York to return to Italy, but she remained in obedience to the Holy See. She visited the whole United States and established sixty-seven houses including orphanages, hospitals and schools in many US Cities. She then worked her way down to Central America. St. Frances Xavier trusted blindly in the Sacred Heart of Jesus, and that trust was not misplaced. Her remains are venerated in the chapel of the High School named after her in New York City. Pope Pius XII canonized this humble, holy woman on July 7, 1946. \*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*

#### ST. MARGUERITE D'YOUVILLE

Marie Marguerite Lajemmerais was born in 1701 to a Breton family that had emigrated to "New France". Her father died when

She was seven years of age. She married François d'Youville. She bore five children, of which only two survived. When she was widowed, she opened a small store to help pay the debts her husband left her with and to care for, François and Charles. Both her sons eventually became priests. St. Marguerite d'Youville's great faith and confidence in the eternal Father laid the foundation for a work in the church, which persevered. She became the foundress of a community of religious women now know as the Grey Nuns. Their first house was established in Montreal. They took in needy people and soon expanded to take care of the poor and the sick. During St. Marguerite d'Youville's lifetime they sisters responded to a call to found a house on the Red River in Manitoba, later founded houses in St. Hyacinthe, Ottawa, Quebec City, Philadelphia and Pembroke. Today the Grey Nuns are working and spreading the Good News not only in Canada and the United States, but also in Central and South America and Africa.

She died December 23, 1771 and was canonized May 9, 1990.She is the First born-in-Canada Saint.

mission work and in 716 sailed with 2 companions to Friesland. He was an excellent preacher and was so successful that Pope Gregory II consecrated him bishop with

jurisdiction over Germany. Legend has it that, when preaching in Germany St. Boniface witnessed people worshiping an oak tree, sacred to the people worshiping Norse gods. That angered the Saint so much that he took an axe to it and split the tree with four blows. He then used the wood to build a chapel. To his surprise in the oak tree stump a tiny fir tree sprung. St. Boniface believed that as the little fir tree grew the Christian Faith would also grow and so it became a symbol of our Faith. At this time the fir trees stayed in the forests with treats for birds and other creatures. Saint Boniface lived from about 675-754.

In the 16<sup>th</sup> century this symbol of Christian Faith was brought into our homes and also our churches. Historians trace the lights on the Christmas Trees to Martin Luther, who tried to simulate the stars in heaven by putting candles on the tree. The Christmas Tree was well established in Germany when Prince Albert brought this custom to England. It was the Hessian mercenaries that brought the custom of the Christmas Tree to North America
